As we venture into the long summer break, some young people may have the opportunity to spend more time online. I thought I would take this opportunity to share some resources that you can use to keep the conversation going with your children. It can be tricky to know where to begin.

Here are some conversation starters that may help. Ask them about how they stay safe online? What tips do they have for you? Maybe they can show you how to do something better online.

Ask them if they know where to go for help, where to find the safety advice and if they know about privacy settings.
