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Curriculum update Learning in action

Learners have been working hard in all areas of the curriculum, taking part in a range of activities in and out of the classroom.

Extra-curricular and project-based learning, known as 'learning in action', helps to make subjects more interesting for pupils, enhance their understanding and reinforce classroom lessons. It also helps learners with their personal, social and emotional development.

Learners from year 6 to year 11 visited Lambourne End - a centre for outdoor learning where they took part in archery, farming activities, and even building rockets. These activities are designed to develop skills in problem solving and team building. Lots of fun (& learning) was had by all!









WORLD SCIENCE DAY

We all love science and students across the school took part in our annual World Science Day. This year, our theme was recycling.

Children at Meridian Campus built models out of materials they had collected. Haselbury learners made eggshell chalk, marble runs and balloon



powered cars. And at Learning for Life, students worked in a mocked up recycling plant.

It was a great day full of hands-on practical learning and experiments.





PROJECT-BASED LEARNING

We use a project-based approach to the curriculum so learners immerse themselves in exciting themes and topics across several subjects.

As part of the Knowledge of the World curriculum, KS2 classes have been learning about England in 1666 and the Great Fire of London. The children re-created historical scenes and used role play to act out the events that took place. These reflected the storybooks they have used in their English lessons. They also made pictures of the fire, which coincided with lessons on Divali and Bonfire Night.







SPOKEN LANGUAGE SKILLS WITH VOICE 21

We have joined the national charity 'Voice 21' to develop our Social and Communication curriculum. The charity works with schools to transform the learning and life choices of young people through speech.

Developing spoken language skills (oracy) helps improve academic success, builds confidence, and enhances employment and life opportunities.

We will be focusing on oracy during lessons, in social settings (such as the dining hall), and in preparation for job roles and future life experiences.


This term, our KS1 children had great fun learning to explore how characters from the story Supertato may have felt.

Our KS3 and KS4 classes have also begun using some Voice 21 strategies in their lessons to provide opportunities for collaborative working and talking including debating and discussing opinions about their class text.

We will be exploring what oracy looks like for all of our children and how we can ensure that our learners are able to express their thinking with others in whichever communication method they use.

Learning in action offers pupils a variety of approaches that include project-based, practical and creative learning environments to help them achieve academic success.

Our goal is to provide a range of activities that enrich the students' learning experience and help them to flourish at school and in life.

Horizon Campus

As this term ends, we've been reflecting on all of the wonderful things that have been happening at Horizon Campus so far this year.

All of our learners are well and truly settled in and are preparing for the next part of their journey.

In addition to their usual timetables, KS5 learners have taken part in mental health awareness activities, worked through Skills Builder tasks, visited the QEII centre and a Skills and Careers Fair at the Excel Centre. Some even caught a glimpse and waved at Prime Minister Rishi Sunak as he visited CONEL recently. Building on their work skills they've begun either a supported or individual work experience placement.

Pre-interns have completed their supported work experience at the Birch Hotel and have created their vocational profiles as they prepare for an individual work experience placement starting next term.



They've taken part in a series of workplace visits learning about a variety of industries and job roles, and also had an inspirational talk by Olympian and gold medallist Joanna Rowsell. They'll now be completing an enterprise project where they've learnt research, design production and evaluation skills.

Interns completed their six week induction having taken part in a series of activities to help prepare them

for their work placements. They've completed First Aid training, taken part in team building activities, visited a range of employers, completed an accredited course in health & safety at work and attended a SIP Job Fair. They're now beginning their work placements in roles they've been matched to in line with their own unique vocational profiles.

All learners across the campus also took part in our fresher's activity at Lambourne End where they had a great day learning outdoors and building their skills. They've also continued to build on their English and Maths learning with many taking part in formal functional skills reading assessments.

Our Horizon Hang Out Club was relaunched this term and is open to learners from across the campus. It's been lovely to see them taking part in our film and games clubs, doing sports with Thrulife coaches and cooking with Carline!


Following a successful quality assurance review we are delighted that our supported internship programme has been recognised and accredited as an area of excellence by Challenge Partners.

Last month, Chickenshed – part of the ECT family – featured on Sky News!

The piece focused on a poll by disability rights charity Dimensions, which revealed that one in five people (21%) had seen someone mocked because of their learning disability. The same rang true for three people - Jenny, Jimmy and Alex – who told Sky how they have been mocked, criticised, or abused, and made to feel 'different' because they have a learning disability.

Luckily for them, all three now say their lives have changed thanks to the outreach projects, education courses, and performances taking place at Chickenshed. It's this very spirit of making people feel valued, included and part of a welcoming community that is at the core of everything that Chickenshed, ECT and all its members are so passionate and determined at achieving for as many young people as possible.

Together, we want to break down these barriers, tackle perceptions in society, and help every young person realise their potential. By providing supportive spaces, environments and opportunities they will feel happy, confident and valued in all aspects of life.

Learning for Life Charity

The aim of our Life in the Community Project at the Charity School, Edmonton Green is to regenerate the historic site and create a new café and community space.

This will provide a range of training and learning opportunities for young people with SEND or disadvantaged groups from the local area, run through the Learning for Life Charity.

We're currently developing our project, preparing our architectural plans for the site, strengthening our business plan and exploring the activities that will be offered. Through all our planning it's essential that we work closely with young people from Enfield, ensuring that they have a voice and play a central role in the shaping of our project.

To achieve this, we've set up a Youth Steering Group (YSG) who meet quarterly and working with our team, explore different aspects of our project and contribute to their development. The YSG is made up of students and young people from Laurel Park School, West Lea School, Orchardside School and Chickenshed Theatre, who are working together, learning from and supporting each other through their participation.




The group first met in September and after being introduced to the historic buildings and the project began to explore the areas that they would like to be involved in. When we met again in November to group took forward these ideas, firstly by developing a brief to appoint artists to work with them and develop creative responses that would help to tell the history of the site to people when they visit. The group has a huge number of extraordinary ideas from murals and mosaics, a statue fountain, light and sound installations and a path that takes you back through time....

Our architects then led a workshop to look more closely at the plans and architectural drawings of the







site, exploring how the group want to use the different spaces and how to think about this through the design process. Again, the group brought a huge number of suggestions about how they wanted the site to be used and also some very dynamic ideas about practical considerations around storage, quiet spaces and equipment.

The YSG will continue to meet throughout the project and will retain this role as we move through future stages. The group brings knowledge, ideas and skills to create a project that is for young people from their community and also provides an opportunity to grow connections and develop new skills that they can take forward.

We are extremely grateful to the YSG and everyone who has helped to make it possible.

Pastoral **update**

SAFEGUARDING OUR CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE ONLINE

As we approach the Christmas break, I recall recent conversations with our students (and my own sons) on Christmas present wishes, which often relate to upgraded digital devices and, for example, the latest PlayStation games.

As a society we spend large amounts of money on security measures to safeguard our families and homes, but we often overlook the risks posed by children having unfiltered access to the internet and strangers through the use of smart phones or games consoles.

When used safely and with the right levels of supervision, the internet is a fantastic tool for researching information, just like the magical lands in Enid Blyton's Faraway Tree books, which I recall my father reading to me and my brother when we were young!



While as parents and carers we feel reassured that our children are safe at home and actively engaged in their rooms, an ever-present danger exists of what children and young people have access to and are exposed to, even without actively searching for specific content.

This point is echoed by Luke Savage, from the NSPCC. In a recent article on the graphic images and video clips widely available on the internet in relation to the ongoing Israel- Hamas war, Luke discusses how the content being shared is incredibly difficult even for adults to process and he raises the concerns about the long-term impact exposure to atrocities of this type may have on a child's mental health and wellbeing.





While the knee-jerk reaction may be to stop children having access to the internet, closely monitoring what they are accessing and ensuring parental controls are in place are two key strategies for keeping children safe. Internet Matters have some useful guides for parents and carers on installing parental controls and privacy settings on devices. bit.ly/parent_internet_matters

We want to equip children with the skills to navigate the internet safely, with the confidence to recognise and report concerning content online. It's important that they know never to reshare content of concern. The Department for Education and the NSPCC have a wealth of information for parents and carers at these links:

HELPING OUR LEARNERS BECOME SKILLED FOR SUCCESS

As educators, one of our main aims is to help our learners prepare for successful adult life.

In the wider community, young people experiencing SEND can find the transition from education to work challenging, and often experience lower employment rates.

To help our young people flourish in the future, we must provide an education that develops the skills, knowledge and characteristics to succeed in all areas beyond school.


This involves creating a wider and more creative curriculum that gives students the ability, experience and opportunity to develop realworld skills. These skills can help them secure employment, become part of a successful community and flourish in adult life.



At West Lea we ensure our curriculum focuses on academic, technical, vocational and extracurricular activities. These help learners develop growth mindsets, critical thinking, problem solving and creativity.

One of the ways we are developing our curriculum at West Lea is by learning from others and sharing our successes. A key part of this has been creating The Enterprise Cooperative Trust (ECT), a partnership made up of like-minded schools and organisations which have a vision to provide a holistic education which goes beyond academic achievement.

These organisations come together regularly to share ideas, best practices and resources and as





Our ECT partners at Chickenshed run several initiatives including peer mentoring, confidence building workshops, and work experience. These activities help build self-belief and independence while strengthening our learner's CV's and work skills.

At Orchardside School, students experience a personalised learning journey. By offering a wider and more flexible curriculum, our students are learning in an environment that promotes wellbeing, good mental health and sets them up for success beyond school.



At West Lea, each student has an Independence Passport that helps them develop and track the skills to become self-sufficient successful adults. To help students succeed in the working world, our Supported Internship Programme (SIP) provides work experience, job coaching and professional training

The result of all of these interventions is that 80% of SIP students secure employment with 9 out of 10 retaining their jobs in the long term.

The dedication of our employees, partners, carers, parents, and students is what makes this possible.

As we move into a new year, that's something to be proud of!

As many of you will know, we are adopting the School Gateway app to help streamline communications.


Using the School Gateway app means you'll receive letters and notifications straight away, and no more lost messages as they will all be in one place.
